#### ALSIP PARK DISTRICT PLANT A LIVING TREE MEMORIAL

#### **PURPOSE**

- TO ALLOW ALSIP RESIDENTS THE OPPORTUNITY TO HONOR AND/ OR MEMORIALIZE RELATIVES AND/OR FRIENDS WITH THE PLANTING OF A TREE IN A PARK DISTRICT PARK OR FACILITY.
- TO ASSIST THE ALSIP PARK DISTRICT WITH THE PROCUREMENT OF NEW TREES PROVIDING YEARS OF SHADE, BEAUTIFICATION AND ENVIRONMENTAL BENEFITS.

#### CRITERIA

- THE ALSIP PARK DISTRICT SHALL IDENTIFY PARKS AND GENERAL LOCATIONS IN EACH PARK WHERE TREES MAY BE PLANTED. CONSIDERATION WILL BE MADE TO ACCOMMODATE LOCATION REQUESTS FROM THE DONOR.
- TREES SHALL BE PLANTED AND MAINTAINED BY THE ALSIP PARK DISTRICT OR THEIR DESIGNATED AGENT. MAINTENANCE OF TREES SHALL BE IN ACCORDANCE WITH PARK PROCEDURE ON TREE MAINTENANCE. DONORS MAY, AT THEIR EXPENSE, PROVIDE MAINTENANCE ASSISTANCE.
- THE TREES SHALL BE PLANTED AT THE APPROPRIATE PLANTING SEASON.
- THE DONOR MAY ASSIST THE ALSIP PARK DISTRICT WITH THE SELECTION OF THE TREE, HOWEVER, THE FINAL DECISION SHALL BE THE ALSIP PARK DISTRICT'S.
- THE DONOR MAY BE PRESENT AT TIME THE TREE IS PLANTED.
- MEMORIAL MARKERS MAY NOT BE PLACED AT THE BASE OR ON THE TREE WITH THE EXCEPTION OF THE FOUNTAIN HILLS GOLF CLUB. MEMORIAL MARKERS WILL BE ALLOWED AT THE LOCATION ONCE APPROVED AND FOR AN ADDITIONAL FEE.
- TREES VANDALIZED OR DESTROYED BY NATURAL CAUSES MAY BE REPLACED BY THE ALSIP PARK DISTRICT ON AN AS CAN BASIS. REPLACEMENT TREES WILL NOT BE THE SAME SIZE AS THE TREE'S MOST CURRENT SIZE.

- MINIMUM SIZE OF TREES SHALL BE A MINIMUM TWO INCH CALIPHER. DONOR MAY SELECT TO CONTRIBUTE ADDITIONAL FUNDING FOR A LARGER TREE.
- ALL TREES BECOME THE PROPERTY OF THE ALSIP PARK DISTRICT.
- PRICE OF THE TREES WILL FLUCTUATE ACCORDING TO MARKET CONDITIONS. IT IS ANTICIPATED THAT THE COST AT THIS TIME WILL NOT EXCEED \$250.00 PER TREE.
- RECOGNITION
   DONORS WILL RECEIVE A LETTER FROM THE ALSIP PARK DISTRICT
   THANKING THEM FOR DONATING A TREE. AT THE DONORS
   REQUEST, THE DISTRICT WILL BE PLEASED TO SEND A LETTER
   ACKNOWLEDGING THE DONATION TO PERSONS BEING
   RECOGNIZED. D.
- THE DISTRICT WILL ESTABLISH A DONOR TREE IN THE APOLLO RECRERATION CENTER RECOGNIZING ALL TREE DONATIONS.

#### **About the Burr Oak:**

The Bur Oak tree, Quercus macrocarpa, is a long-lived majestic oak tree. It is also called the Burr Oak. The Bur Oak is a tall, fairly slow-growing, long-lived tree, highly desirable for windbreaks, shelterbelts and ornamental use. It has an impressive crown with a massive trunk, which makes it a picturesque specimen. Bur Oak trees adapt to various soils where other oaks may fail.

This deciduous tree is tolerant to urban conditions. Autumn colors are yellow-green, yellow, and yellow brown. The tree will bear acorns in the nursery in ten years.

#### **About the Hackberry:**

The Hackberry tree, Celtis Occidentalis, is a superior tree that withstands heat, drought, wind, and alkaline soils. The Hackberry tree is tall, and has similar spread, with ascending arching branches, and some drooping branches. Hackberry trees have a large spreading crown with red-orange fruit in the fall.

This deciduous tree has low water requirements, and a high tolerance to salt and alkali soils and urban conditions. Light green summer foliage turns to a yellow fall color. The Hackberry is a moderate growing rugged tree. The trunk takes on a corky appearance as it matures.

#### About the Northern Red Oak:

The Northern Red Oak tree, Quercus borealis, is known for its strength and brilliant fall color. Northern Red Oak trees are used as a specimen tree and also for wildlife. It has moderate water requirements and has a moderate tolerance to salt and alkali soils. The form of this tree is rounded and the ascending, usually massive branches, tend to branch low to the ground.

Fall colors are from yellow-brown to russet-red and bright red. New leaves have a reddish tinge in the spring. Commercially valuable wood. They will bear acorns in 10-12 years in the nursery. Does best in well-drained soils. A very widely planted tree.

#### **About the Thornless Honeylocust:**

The Thornless Honeylocust tree, Gleditsia Triacanthos, is fast growing as a young tree and will grow 2' or more a year over a 10-year period. Readily transplanted, it withstands a wide range of conditions although it reaches maximum development on rich, moist bottomlands or on soils of a limestone origin.

This deciduous tree is tolerant of drought conditions, high pH, and is salt tolerant. Thornless Honeylocust trees are an excellent lawn tree for filtered shade. The fine small textured leaves casts a light shade and usually do not need raking in the fall.

#### About the White Oak:

The White Oak tree, Quercus alba, is a great majestic long-lived tree that will last for generations. It is an excellent wildlife source of food mass in the form of acorns. This deciduous shade tree has moderate water requirements and has a moderate tolerance to salt and alkali soils. Does best on deep, moist, well-drained, acid soils. This tree grows at a moderate pace. The White Oak is pyramidal in youth and then develops broad crown with age.

The dense foliage is bluish-green, to reddish-brown in fall. The White Oak is the tree from which the phrase "The Mighty Oak" was coined. It is an excellent specimen tree needing plenty of room to mature properly. Advantages of the White Oak are that they are easily transplanted when young and they have a high resistance to ice breakage and oak wilt. They require very little maintenance.

#### **About the Cleveland Select Pear:**

The "Cleveland Select" pear trees (Pyrus calleryana "Cleveland Select") belong to the Callery pear family, noted for their early spring bloom and glossy green leaves. This particular variety grow 25 to 35 feet tall and 15 feet wide in U.S. Department of Agriculture plant hardiness zones 5 through 9. It has some advantages over the related "Bradford" pear (Pyrus calleryana "Bradford"), which grows in the same USDA zones.

This attractive, narrow, pyramidal shade, making it better fit for narrower spaces than wider, can tolerate heat and pollution, which makes it suited in the yards and along the streets of urban areas. It flowers densely in spring with white blooms and its leaves turn a striking red-orange color in fall.
